II. What is the CSCA? Understanding the CSCA Exam

The **China Scholastic Competency Assessment (CSCA)** is an entrance test for international undergraduates, created to give Chinese universities a common benchmark for judging whether applicants are ready for degree study.

The test is developed and administered under the **China Scholarship Council (CSC)**. Beginning with the **2026 intake**, the **CSCA score report (transcript)** becomes a **mandatory** document for undergraduate applications to Chinese Government Scholarship universities.

Before CSCA: For a long time, getting into Chinese universities as an international student was confusing and inconsistent. The main challenge was that students came from different countries with different education systems and curriculums. This made it extremely difficult for Chinese universities to fairly compare applicants' academic abilities, especially in subjects like mathematics where curriculum rigor and grading standards varied dramatically between countries. A student with 90% in math from one country might have a completely different skill level than a student with 90% from another country. There was no standardized way to assess whether international students had the foundational knowledge needed for Chinese university programs.

What CSCA Does: The CSCA completely changes this. It creates one clear, standardized test that all universities recognize and trust. For international students, this is a game-changer: you finally know exactly what you need to prepare for, how you'll be evaluated, and what schools are looking for.

What Is It? According to the China Scholarship Council (CSC), the CSCA is a fair and scientific test that measures whether you're ready for university-level study. Think of it as China's way of making international admissions as structured and rigorous as the gaokao (the national college entrance exam for Chinese students) but designed to work for students from any educational background around the world.

Students must take the CSCA exam before applying for CSC scholarships or universities that require these results for admission.

- By 2028: Expected to be mandatory for ALL undergraduate applicants

Why the CSCA Matters:

The CSCA replaces the old document-based admission system with a transparent, standardized evaluation comparable to China's gaokao (for domestic students) or SAT/A-Levels internationally. It ensures:

- Fair evaluation across diverse educational systems
- Unified standards for academic readiness
- Merit-based selection for scholarships and admissions

III. Exam Structure & Subject Requirements

The exam consists of **5 subjects**. You do not necessarily take all of them; your selection depends on your major.

Subject	Time	Questions	Language	Who Needs It?
Mathematics	60 min	48 Multiple Choice	English or Chinese	MANDATORY for all applicants.
Physics	60 min	48 Multiple Choice	English or Chinese	Required for Engineering, Computer Science, and Physical Sciences programs.
Chemistry	60 min	48 Multiple Choice	English or Chinese	Required for Medicine (MBBS), Chemical Engineering, and Biological Sciences programs.
Humanities Chinese	90 min	80 Multiple Choice	Chinese Only	Required for Chinese-Taught Humanities, Arts, Law, and Social Sciences programs.
STEM Chinese	90 min	80 Multiple Choice	Chinese Only	Required for Chinese-Taught STEM, Engineering, and Medicine programs.

Important Notes:

• Science, engineering, agriculture, and medical majors typically require **at least one** of Physics or Chemistry. Always verify with your target university's specific requirements.

IV. Subject Requirements by Program Type

Your specific exam subjects depend on two factors: your Major and your Language of Instruction.

Please take note that these are not official, you need to double check with the university you are applying for which subject they require for a specific program, please visit the university official admissions guide.

Category A: Design, Film & Arts Majors (Your Focus)

Includes: Visual Communication, Architecture, Animation, Film Production, Fine Arts, Fashion Design.

Language of Instruction	Mandatory CSCA Subjects	Why?
Chinese-Taught	1. Mathematics (English or Chinese) 2. Humanities Chinese	You need "Humanities Chinese" to prove you can read art history/theory textbooks. Math is a national requirement for all degrees.
English-Taught	1. Mathematics (English or Chinese)	You are exempt from the Chinese test, but Math is still required to prove basic academic logic.

Note for Architecture: Some universities classify Architecture as "Engineering" rather than "Arts." In this case, you might also be required to take Physics. Check your specific university's brochure.

Category B: STEM Majors

Includes: Engineering, Computer Science, Physics, Math.

Language of Instruction	Mandatory CSCA Subjects
Chinese-Taught	Math + Physics + STEM Chinese
English-Taught	Math + Physics

Category C: Medicine (MBBS) & Biological Sciences

Includes: Clinical Medicine, Pharmacy, Biology.

Language of Instruction	Mandatory CSCA Subjects
Chinese-Taught	Math + Chemistry + STEM Chinese
English-Taught	Math + Chemistry (Some universities may also require Physics)

Category D: Business & Social Sciences

Includes: Economics, Law, International Relations, Business Administration.

Language of Instruction	Mandatory CSCA Subjects
Chinese-Taught	Math + Humanities Chinese
English-Taught	Math Only

V. Detailed Syllabus (Official 2025 Edition by CSCA)

Mathematics (100 Points)

- Sets & Inequalities: Set operations; Quadratic and rational inequalities.
- Functions: Domain/Range, Monotonicity, Parity; Power, Exponential, Logarithmic, and Trigonometric functions; Arithmetic/Geometric sequences; Basics of Derivatives/Calculus.
- Geometry & Algebra: Analytic geometry (Lines, Circles, Ellipses, Hyperbolas, Parabolas);
 Vectors; Complex Numbers; Solid Geometry (Space coordinates).
- Probability & Statistics: Classical probability; Mean/Variance; Normal distribution.

Physics (100 Points)

- Mechanics: Velocity/Acceleration; Newton's Laws; Momentum/Impulse; Work & Energy;
 Circular Motion; Simple Harmonic Motion.
- **Electromagnetism:** Coulomb's Law; Ohm's Law; Magnetic Induction; Lorentz Force; Faraday's & Lenz's Law.
- Thermodynamics: Molecular theory; Ideal gas equation; First law of thermodynamics.
- Optics: Reflection/Refraction; Interference/Diffraction.
- Modern Physics: Photoelectric effect; Atomic structure; Nuclear physics.

Chemistry (100 Points)

- Basic Concepts: State changes; Chemical equations; Solution pH/Concentration; Ideal Gas Law.
- **Properties & Reactions:** Inorganic substances (Acids, Bases, Salts, Metals); Organic compounds (Hydrocarbons); Redox reactions; Ion reactions.
- Theory: Periodic trends; Chemical bonds/Intermolecular forces; Reaction rates/Equilibrium; Electrochemistry.
- **Experiments:** Lab safety; Gas identification; Purification methods.

Professional Chinese (100 Points)

This is NOT HSK. It tests academic language ability.

- Science Track (理科中文): Math symbols, Physics laws, Lab operations, Data chart interpretation.
- Humanities Track (文科中文): Literature, Philosophy, Law, History, Education, Politics.
- Question Types: Character recognition, Vocab fill-in-the-blank, Paragraph completion, Reading comprehension.

VI. Understanding China's Education System

How China's System Differs

1. Academic Rigor & Standards

- Gaokao legacy: The domestic entrance exam is known for its difficulty
- Foundation focus: Strong emphasis on fundamental concepts
- Problem-solving speed: Quick recall and application under time pressure
- Theoretical depth: Deep understanding over breadth

2. Teaching Style

- Lecture-based: More teacher-centered than Western universities
- Examination-oriented: Regular tests and assessments
- Group study culture: Students often study in groups
- Homework load: Expect substantial daily/weekly assignments

3. Academic Calendar

- Fall Semester: September January
- Spring Semester: February/March July
- Long summer break: July August
- Short winter break: January February

4. Language Environment

- Chinese-taught programs: Expect 100% instruction in Chinese
- English-taught programs: May still require basic Chinese for daily life
- HSK requirement: Most Chinese-taught programs require HSK 4-5
- Academic Chinese: Different from conversational Chinese (focus on specialized vocabulary)

VII. Scoring & Validity

- Score Release: 7 business days after the exam (Electronic report via <u>csca.cn</u>).
- Validity: Scores are valid for 2 Years.
 - Note: Admissions officers generally prefer scores from the most recent intake cycle.
- **Usage:** Universities can verify your score online using the certificate number. Percentile rankings are also provided to universities to judge your global competitiveness.

VIII. Application Timeline & Planning

Critical Dates for 2026 Intake

Phase 1: Preparation (Now - November 2025)

September - October 2025:

- Research target universities and programs
- Identify required CSCA subjects
- Begin intensive preparation (minimum 3-6 months recommended)
- Gather application documents (transcripts, recommendations, etc.)

November 2025:

- **CSCA** registration opens
- Complete registration on https://csca.cn
- Pay exam fees (450 RMB (\$63 USD) for 1 subject, 700 RMB (\$98 USD) for 2+)
- Run technical checks for online testing

Phase 2: Examination (December 2025 - June 2026)

December 21, 2025 - First Global CSCA Exam

• **Professional Chinese:** 13:00-14:30 (Beijing Time)

• Mathematics: 15:30-16:30 (Beijing Time)

• **Physics:** 17:30-18:30 (Beijing Time)

• **Chemistry:** 19:30-20:30 (Beijing Time)

• Results released: Within 7 days (online/CBT) or 14 days (paper)

2026 Exam Sessions:

- December 21, 2025
- January 25, 2026
- March 15, 2026
- April 2026
- June 2026

Phase 3: Application Submission (January - June 2026)

Recommended Timeline for September 2026 Enrollment

Option A: Early Bird (Recommended)

- Take CSCA: December 2025 or January 2026
- Receive scores: Late December 2025 / Early February 2026
- Apply to universities: February April 2026
- Receive admission decisions: March May 2026
- Apply for visa: May July 2026

Option B: Standard Track

- Take CSCA: March or April 2026
- Receive scores: Late March / Late April 2026
- Apply to universities: April June 2026
- Receive admission decisions: May July 2026
- Apply for visa: June August 2026

Option C: Last Chance

- Take CSCA: June 2026
- Receive scores: Late June 2026
- Apply to universities: July 2026

• **Risk:** Very tight timeline, no room for retakes

Phase 4: Visa & Preparation (June - August 2026)

- Receive JW202 form from university
- Apply for X1 student visa at Chinese embassy
- Book flights and accommodation
- Complete pre-departure preparations

General Rule: Take the exam **6-8 months before** intended enrollment to allow time for:

- Score release (1-2 weeks)
- Application processing (1-3 months)
- Retakes if needed (minimum 1 month between attempts)
- Visa processing (1-2 months)

IX. How to register for the CSCA

Where to register

All candidates register on the official CSCA website at csca.cn. This is the only place to create your account, pick subjects, choose a test window, and pay the fee.

When to register

For the inaugural sitting, registration opens in November 2025. From 2026 onward, registration windows are published ahead of each sitting across the year. Always check the portal for the latest dates.

Step by step registration process

- Create your account on csca.cn with your full name exactly as in your passport. Verify your email and complete your personal profile.
- 2. **Fill in your application basics**. Choose the program language and intended major direction so the correct exam subject options appear.
- Choose your subjects. Mathematics is required for all applicants, while Physics and Chemistry are optional (depend on the major). Professional Chinese (Humanities Chinese or STEM Chinese) is required for applicants applying for Chinese-taught programs.
- 4. **Pick a test window**. The first global inaugural test will be held on December 21, 2025. From 2026 there are five sittings each year (scheduled in January, March, April, June, and December). Pick a schedule that will leave enough time for score release before your earliest university deadline.
- 5. **Select the test mode.** Applicants can choose to do an at-home online test. Some locations will add offline centers over time.
- 6. **Upload your photo and ID details.** Follow the portal's format and size rules. Double-check passport number, name, and date of birth.
- 7. **Pay the fee through the portal.** The current fee is RMB 450 for one subject or RMB 700 total for two or more subjects. Keep your payment confirmation.

X. Technical Requirements (Strictly Enforced)

The exam uses a "Home-Based Online" format with AI and human proctoring. You must meet these requirements or you cannot take the test.

Primary Device (Computer)

- OS: Windows 10 / 11 OR Windows 7 SP1 (64-bit).
- X MacOS is NOT SUPPORTED. (Do not use Mac).
- Storage: At least 2GB free space (Avoid installing on C drive if possible).
- Screen: Resolution ≥ 1366×768.
- Webcam: Built-in or external USB (≥720p). Must face you directly.
- Audio: Microphone and Speakers required. X Wireless Headphones/Earbuds are PROHIBITED.

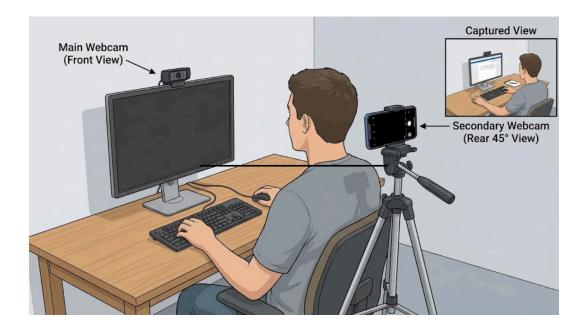
Drafting Tools (CRITICAL UPDATE)

Standard paper is PROHIBITED. You must use one of the following:

- 1. A small Whiteboard with an erasable marker.
- 2. A blank sheet of paper inside a Transparent Document Sleeve/Bag with an erasable marker.
- Rule: You must erase your notes in front of the camera at the end of the exam.

XI. The "Two-Device" Setup Guide

You are required to have a Secondary Monitoring Device (Phone or Tablet).



1. Positioning

- Place it on a tripod or stable stand.
- Angle: 45 degrees behind you (to your side).
- View: Camera must see You (Profile) + Your Hands + Your Computer Screen + The Desk.

2. Device Settings (Must Follow)

- Airplane Mode: ON (This is critical just in case someone calls your phone).
- Wi-Fi: ON (Enable Wi-Fi after turning on Airplane mode).
- Do Not Disturb: ON.
- Power: Keep it plugged into a charger, or make sure the battery is sufficient for the entire duration of your exam.

XII. How Proctored Exams Work

Exam Formats (3 Options)

Option 1: Remote Home-Based Testing (Online)

- Availability: Worldwide during early rollout period
- **Setup:** Take the exam from your home with remote proctoring

Requirements:

1. Computer:

- o Windows 8.1 or higher (Mac NOT supported currently)
- Functioning webcam (built-in or external USB)
- Microphone
- Administrative access to install proctoring software

2. Internet Connection:

- o Minimum: Stable 10+ Mbps
- o **Recommended:** 20+ Mbps for reliability
- Backup 4G hotspot highly recommended

3. Secondary Device:

- Phone or tablet for additional monitoring angle
- Camera must be functional

4. Testing Environment:

- o Private, quiet room with closed door
- Well-lit space (natural or artificial light)
- Clear desk NO books, notes, or unauthorized materials
- No other people in the room

Not Allowed:

- Beverages or food
- Books, notes, or any reference materials
- Calculators
- Scratch paper (whiteboard and marker may be allowed confirm)

Option 2: On-Site Computer-Based Test (CBT)

- Availability: Selected testing centers in major countries
- Current Locations: Vietnam, Thailand, India, South Korea, Japan, Malaysia, and Kazakhstan

Advantages:

- More reliable (no internet issues)
- Controlled environment
- Technical support on-site

Process:

- Register for CBT option
- Arrive 30 minutes early with valid passport
- Follow center's security protocols
- Complete exam on provided computer

Option 3: Paper-Based Test

- Availability: Very limited, specific locations only
- Results Delay: 14 working days (vs. 7 days for online/CBT)

Exam Day Timeline & Rules

Pre-Exam (30-60 Minutes Before)

- 1. Clear the Room: No other people, no books, no electronics.
- 2. **Login:** You **must** log in 30–60 mins early.
- 3. Verification: Complete Facial Recognition and hold your Original Passport to the camera.
- 4. **Environment Scan:** You will be asked to pan your camera 360° around the room.

During the Exam

- No Leaving: You cannot leave your seat (unless approved for emergency).
- Eye Contact: Keep eyes on the screen. Looking away frequently triggers Al flags.
- **Drafting:** Use your whiteboard/transparent sleeve only.
- **Tech Issues:** If internet drops, log back in immediately (answers are auto-saved). If the issue persists, contact the proctor via the software.

Post-Exam

- 1. **Submission:** Wait for the "Scroll submitted successfully" message.
- 2. Erase Notes: Show your whiteboard/sleeve to the camera and ERASE IT before closing the software.
- 3. **Exit:** Close the application.

XVI. Frequently Asked Questions

1. Is CSCA mandatory for all international students?

CSCA is required for admission to undergraduate programs at Chinese Government Scholarship universities.

2. Is there an age limit?

No upper limit. However, candidates under 14 must have a guardian's consent and assistance to register.

3. What are the universities that require CSCA?

All chinese government scholarship (CSC) universities require students to take CSCA exam. You can check here university admissions pages and 2026 prospectuses:

- Tianjin University (2026 Admissions Guide)
- Nankai University (2026 Admissions Guide)
- Zhejiang University (2026 Admissions Guide)

4. What are the universities that don't require a CSCA exam?

As of November 2025, these are the universities not yet requiring CSCA for 2026 intake: - Tsinghua University (but if you wish to apply for a CSC scholarship, you need to take the CSCA exam).

- Beijing Normal-Hong Kong Baptist University (BNBU)
- University of Nottingham Ningbo China (UNNC)
- Xi'an Jiaotong-Liverpool University (XJTLU)
- Sino-British College, USST
- CUHK-Shenzhen

5. What exam subject should I take?

The subjects you must take for the CSCA are determined primarily by your intended major and the language of instruction. Mathematics is MANDATORY for all applicants, regardless of whether you are pursuing Engineering, Medicine, or Design.

For STEM and Medicine majors, you must take an additional science subject. Furthermore, if you are applying to any Chinese-taught program, you must include one of the two

Specialized Chinese tracks (either STEM Chinese or Humanities Chinese) to demonstrate your academic language proficiency.

6. What is the language of the exam?

The language options depend on the subject. You do not have to take all subjects in the same language. For the three Basic Disciplines (Mathematics, Physics, and Chemistry), you have a choice to take the exam in either English or Chinese. This is designed to allow international students to use their strongest academic language for technical subjects.

However, the Professional Chinese subjects (Humanities and STEM Chinese) are offered in Chinese ONLY, as the entire purpose of these tests is to measure your readiness to handle university-level material in the Chinese language.

7. If I don't apply to a university that offers Chinese government scholarships, can I still take this exam?

Students are welcome and encourage all students planning to study in China to take the CSCA exams. An excellent CSCA score report can be a strong asset in your application to any Chinese university, comprehensively demonstrating your academic abilities.

8. Can I use a Mac if I install Windows on it?

The official rule states "MacOS is not supported." Using Boot Camp or Parallels is risky as the anti-cheat software may flag the virtualization as a security threat. It is strongly recommended to borrow a native Windows laptop.

9. Can I retake the exam if I fail?

Yes. Since there are multiple sessions (Jan, March, June, Dec), you can pay to retake it. However, be careful with application deadlines - a June retake might be too late for a scholarship application closing in March.

10. Can I change my exam subject or language after registering?

No. Once the Admission Ticket is generated, information cannot be changed. Verify your choices carefully before paying.

11. How many times can I retake the exam?

There is no limit on the number of times you can retake the CSCA. As long as you pay the exam fee again, you can register for the next available session. However, because of application deadlines and the exam schedule, you will realistically only have 1 or 2 chances to get a score that works for a specific September intake.

12. Is there a chance for me to study in China if I fail the exam?

Yes, you can retake the exam unlimited times, or apply to Chinese universities that don't require CSCA for 2026 intake. Scores are valid for two years.

13. Is paper-based testing available?

Not for December 2025. The first global exam is exclusively Home-Based Online (or Computer-Based at select centers). Paper exams are currently suspended; check the website for future updates.
